Ghostface Killah was a little late getting to the stage, performing his recent single "Back Like That," which features Ne-Yo on the track, and other classic hits like "Ice Cream." He kept the crowd entertained throughout his set by interjecting snippets of the late rap icon, ODB's more famous songs in his show.

This idea was repeated when Bone Thugs-N-Harmony interjected snippets of classic hip-hop songs that they collaborated on with the late Eazy-E and Tupac into their set. Bone also performed material from their new album "Strength and Loyalty," including the new single which features Akon, "I Try."

"I thought that Verbal Ase and The Chapter were really great acts for Rebelpalooza," said Ashley Summers, a UNLV student. "I thought that Bone put

on an amazing show and didn't disappoint," she added.

The final act on the stage, Oscar-winners Three-6-Mafia, performed snippets from several of their hit songs, including "Sippin' on Sizzurp" and "It's Hard out Here for a Pimp." They kept stopping their show because of excessive fan rowdiness; once, because a fan threw something on stage, and later, to alert security to an altercation happening in the crowd.

It wasn't a surprise when attendees began leaving early even before Three-6-Mafia performed their more recent songs.

"Three-6 came off like they were too cool to be there. It seemed like they did a lot of yelling about the crowd. They should have just came in, did their thing and enjoyed the people," said Ashley Summers.

"It looked as if there was a big crowd for Bone, but then it thinned out for Three-6-Mafia," he added. Even though there were some problems the majority of attendees seemed to enjoy the show.

"The Music was okay, and the venue was clean," said Juarez. "I thought the concert was great," said Josh Summers. "All in all, I thought Rebelpalooza was fantastic and I will definitely be going again next year," added Ashley Summers.
