# The battle for witness protect

BALTIMORE (NNPA) -Just hours before a jury convicted a Baltimore man of attempting to kill a witness in his brother's murder trial, U.S. Rep. Elijah E. Cummings and Baltimore City State's Attorney Patricia C. Jessamy stood outside the Clarence M. Mitchell Jr. Courthouse on last week to call for more federal assistance in protecting witnesses.

Surrounded by other prosecutors from her office, Jessamy and Cummings also urged support for federal legislation he introduced that would provide millions in grants to local prosecutors for protecting witnesses.

Cummings said that without witnesses who cooperate with police and prosecutors, the criminal justice system "erodes."

"People are tired. They're tired of seeing their loved ones harmed. And then when it comes time to gather the evidence, nobody saw it because everybody's scared," Cummings said.

"I don't care how you look at it. Many of our cases are affected by witness intimidation — people coming to other's doors and threatening them, telling them that if they 'snitch' they're going to be hurt or they're going to be killed."

Cummings' legislation would create a state witness protection program within the U.S. Marshalls Service and authorize \$90 million in competitive grants for each of the next three years.

The grants would be available to state and local prosecutors to protect witnesses in cases involving homicides or serious violent felonies or drug cases.

Currently, non-federal witnesses can participate in the federal witness protection program under certain circumstances, but states are required to reimburse the federal government for the cost unless a waiver is granted.

Under the federal witness protection program, the U.S. Marshalls Services provides families with long-term protection, relocation, new iden-

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medical treatment and funds to cover their most essential

Last year, Baltimore spent more than \$300,000 on its witness assistance program and is expected to spend \$500,000 this year, mostly in the form of relocation assistance, Jessamy said.

The program assisted 106 families through June 20 of this year, according to the state attorney's office, compared to 92 families at the same point last year. Through June, 19 families have been

The day of the press conference, a city jury convicted Myron Gladney, 21, of attempted first-degree murder, witness intimidation and a handgun charge in the April 2005 shooting of Stephen Arrington.

Arrington was chased and shot in the back the day before he was to appear as a state's witness in the murder trial of Anthony Gladney, Myron Gladney's brother. Ultimately, Anthony Gladney was acquitted of the murder charge.

And on July 2, Carl Stanley Lackl, was shot and killed while standing outside his home with his 10-yearold daughter. Lackl was killed eight days before he was to testify for the state in the murder trial of Patrick

Byers, 22, is accused of killing 30-year-old Larry Haynes in the 2400 block of E. Jefferson St. in March
