Rash of copper thefts upsets Detroit lawmakers

DETROIT (NNPA) - A recent hearing at the Northwest Activities Center by the Senate Committee on Economic Development and Regulatory Reform probed further the issue of copper theft in the city.

The panel included chairman Alan Sanborn and members Jud Gilbert, R-Algonac; Gilda Jacobs, D-Huntington Woods; and Buzz Thomas, D-Detroit.

Senate Bill 720, sponsored by Thomas, seeks to strengthen regulation of scrap metal processing establishments by requiring that business owners record and report all copper and metalrelated business transactions to local law enforcement agencies.

The three-hour meeting provided a forum for people who have been affected by the theft of copper and other valuable metal fixtures to speak on the subject.

"This an issue of epidemic

proportions," Thomas said. "Property, public safety and lives are at risk."

Testimony came from scrap metal processors, AT&T of Michigan officials, area home realtors, the state's Department of Homeland Security and the Wayne County prosecutor and sheriff. Officials from the Detroit Police Department as well as prominent clergy leaders and area homeowners joined

The committee is expected over the next several weeks to give additional consideration to the bill. But copper theft will not be slowed until harsher penalties are enforced, says William L. Elson, senior vice president general counsel, Fritz Enterprises Inc.

His company has implemented a number of security measures to help solve the problem, but he can't do it alone. Elson is firmly committed to doing whatever is necessary to stop copper theft by starting with those who

"You've got to get people put in jail who are doing this," he said. "If the task force gets started, that's great. We're willing to make a commitment. I was surprised that the big companies didn't step up right away and say, 'We're wiling to do this.""

He hopes that the Senate Committee on Economic Development and Regulatory Reform, will produce results.

The committee will hear testimony on Senate Bill 720. Sen. Buzz Thomas' bill's plan is to strengthen regulation and recording requirement on scrap metal processors throughout the state of Michigan. It requires that scrap metal processors record all transactions and provide them to local law enforcement officials. It will also address the epidemic of copper theft that is hurting

Elson has set up safeguards at his business. "We take pictures, we take their announcement that it's not stolen, we do all of that," he

"I think the task force is a great idea. We've got to get the state police involved. We have to have a coordinated effort so that the intrastate transportation of this material is thwarted. You would think people would jump on this and help."

Unfortunately, there are no distinguishing features of an AT&T wire versus a DTE wire, which makes the problem more difficult to control when scrapyards can't identity where the scrap comes

"In my view, it has to be more than lip service, it needs to be more than just an ordinance; you need a coordinated effort with Oakland county and Genesee County and the state police, so that you have some control over the transportation of this material," Elson said.

"If these folks get the idea that someone is watching,

license and have them sign an they'll slow down. That's why we've assisted the city and the county. Wayne County Prosecutor Kym Worthy told us she needed a half a million dollars to operate that task force for a year. You really need a twoyear commitment to do it."

Elson noted that copper scrap has become a world market and as such, the local, state and federal governments should take it seri-

"This story's made national news, but you've got to convict them, you've got to put people in jail," he said. "If no one's getting arrested and put in jail, it's not a deterrent."
