Ex-felons given chance by law

WASHINGTON (NNPA) - U.S. Rep. Danny K. Davis (D-III.) stood behind President George Bush as he sat down, pen in hand, in front of the open folder. Among the string of witnesses beside Davis were Black Caucus members Reps. Bobby Scott (Va.), Stephanie Tubbs Jones (Ohio) and House Judiciary Committee Chairman John Conyers (Mich.).

It was a rare, but happily unified non-partisan gathering to sign what had once appeared to be a mission-impossible for Davis. It was five years ago when he first conceived, introduced and began fighting for the Second Chance Act to deter the recidivism rate that is so disparate among Black inmates. For five years straight, the legislation failed to make it through Congress.

Finally, mainly due to a Democratic Congress, the refusal of Davis and his Senate co-patron Joseph Biden (Del.) to give up, and some strong bipartisan coalescing, the Second Chance Act, last week, was being signed by Republican President Bush.

Davis is exuberant about the possible impact.

"It's a comprehensive approach to looking at what it takes to get a person back into normal life. Even more than the programs that are going to actually be funded, it is an opportunity to help Americans to change their mindsets and to help put corrections and rehabilitation as a central part of our criminal justice system," Davis said in an interview after the signing that took place inside the Old Executive Office Building adjacent to the White House. "There is no point in talking corrections until we do things to correct. The concept calls for be-

LAS VEGAS (AP) - A 26-year-old entrepreneur from Texas was named Miss USA recently, besting 50 other beauty queens for the coveted crown.



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

gized Monday for calling presidential contender and U.S. Sen. Barack Obama (D-III.) "boy" during a Northern Kentucky dinner over the weekend.

"My poor choice of words is regrettable and was in no way meant to impugn you or your integrity," Davis wrote in a letter that staffers said was hand-delivered to Obama's U.S. Senate office. "I offer my sincere apology to you and ask for your forgiveness."

Davis continued: "Though we may disagree on many issues, I know that we share

the goal of a prosperous, secure future for U.S. Rep Geoff Davis (R-Ky) apolo- our nation. My comment has detracted from the dialogue that we should all be having on legitimate policy differences and in no way reflects the personal and professional respect I have for you."

The word "boy" is considered extremely offensive by many African-Americans, as it was used by Southern Whites in the Jim Crow South to assert racial superiority.
