Aide: Obama won't forget Blacks

(NNPA) - Many African-Americans are asking: Now that Barack Obama has won the White House, will he be so eager to govern from the center that he will forget about his obligations to

Valerie Jarrett, a longtime friend and one of his closest advisers, gave an emphatic reply to that question on Sunday - no.

In a private meeting with the Trotter Group, an organization of African-American columnists, Jarrett fielded numerous questions about Obama's commitment to Blacks. And, in each instance, she left no doubt that the president-elect, who has a straight-A Senate rating from the NAACP, will remain true to his past.

Jarrett, one of three chairs of Obama's transition team, was asked why so few African-Americans are being mentioned in speculation about future cabinet posts. She replied, "There isn't a single name on that list that you've heard from Presidentelect Obama. There's not a single name on that list that you've heard from me, or from John Podesta or from Peter Rouse," she said, referring to the three co-chairs of Obama's transition team.

"Or, now from Rahm Emanuel. So the five people who actually do know the names on the list, you haven't spoken to them. So what I think you see in the newspaper is what everybody speculates. I haven't seen the list but my guess is they're speculating on the

Some of that speculation has centered on Jarrett, a Chicago real estate executive. Some have suggested that she might become Secretary of Housing and Urban Development or head the Commerce Department. But there are news reports out of Chicago that she is the front-runner to replace Obama in the U.S. Senate. In her meeting with journalists, Jarrett said she would be willing to serve in any capacity that Obama

Mos Def sought over camera

LAS VEGAS (AP) -Mos Def was being sought by police on an arrest warrant stemming from a scuffle with a photographer at a fashion trade show last August, authorities and the alleged victim said recently.

"I had no idea who the man was," said Volker Corell, 60, a Los Angelesbased photographer who said the 35-year-old rapper and actor, whose real name is Dante Terrell Smith, ripped his camera from around his neck Aug. 26.

Corell said he was credentialed to represent a trade publication, and was taking photos at the Men's Apparel and Garment Industry Convention in Las Vegas when he was allegedly attacked. He said the last four photos before his camera was broken clearly show Smith reaching toward him.

The last shot was his hands in front of the lens," Corell said.

Investigators expected Smith would turn himself by the end of the week to face a warrant charge of felony robbery and misdemeanor malicious destruction of property, Las Vegas police spokesman Ramon Denby said.

Mos Def's publicist, Carleen Donovan in New York City, did not immediately respond to messages seeking comment.

The warrant was issued Tuesday, said Michael Sommermeyer, a court spokesman.

Corell said he received a cut on his left hand in the scuffle, and that two Las Vegas Convention Center security guards retrieved the camera. Repairs to the camera cost \$178, police said in court documents.

Jackson gives up title to Neverland

LOS ANGELES - Michael Jackson has given up title to his Neverland ranch, transferring the deed to a company he partly controls. The singer filed a grant deed on the ranch Monday that makes the new owner an entity called the Sycamore Valley Ranch Co. LLC.

Sycamore Valley Ranch Co. is a joint venture between Jackson and an affiliate of Colony Capital LLC, according to a person with knowledge of the transaction who was not authorized to speak on the record and requested anonymity.

The person could not say what would become of the 2,500acre property in the bucolic, oak-studded hills of Santa Barbara County's wine country, 120 miles northwest of Los Angeles. Jackson had gone into default on the \$24.5 million he owes on the property and had faced foreclosure before Colony Capital bailed him out earlier this year by purchasing his loan.

Colony Capital is a Los Angeles-based real estate investment company run by billionaire Tom Barrack. It owns several properties in Las Vegas, including the Las Vegas Hilton.

At the height of his popularity, the superstar invited thousands of children to play on the grounds.

He has not been seen in the Los Olivos area since a jury acquitted him of all molestation charges, and recent aerial photos show the ranch falling into disrepair.
