McMorris mainstay in Las Vegas

Lillian McMorris has had a front-row seat to the growth of Las Vegas and, ironically, for most of that time, she's helped tell the city's story. A veteran of television and radio, McMorris is well known for her earnest devotion to civic causes. As public affairs director for the now-cancelled "A.M. Southern Nevada" show, McMorris interviewed hundreds of people working to improve live in the Las Vegas Valley and she championed a myriad of worthwhile causes.

"Lillian probably knows the name of every non-profit organization in Southern Nevada," said Robert D. Fisher, president of the Nevada Broadcasters Association. "Lillian is familiar with probably every major event that takes place in a given year. Lillian probably knows the name of every elected and appointed official who represents Southern Nevada. Lillian cares for and fights for the underdog, the underrepresented, the poor,

the forgotten and the homeless. She is a doer. She gets things done. She makes things happen."

The Las Vegas native worked in customer service at a telephone company, dealt poker at the Four Queens Hotel and Casino and served as casino floor manager at the Hacienda before finding a niche assisting people. Officials from Envirotech International asked her to help them build their cachet in the community - the company wanted to introduce its waterless car wash system to the

The marketing and public relations experience proved valuable in her next job as host of "A.M. Southern Nevada," where she worked for 10 years as a conduit between the KVVU Channel 5 and Valley nonprofits. When the position was eliminated, McMorris turned to entrepreneurship, using her vast experience and community contacts to help nonprofits and small businesses promote their goods and services.



"After leaving KVVU TV FOX5 in 2002, I received many e-mails and telephone calls from people requesting information on programs and activities," she said. "My favorite color is purple so I became the Purple Resource. As my company evolved, I personalized the name to represent not only the personal attention which I bring to everyone I meet, but also the resourcefulness and ability to match needs, find solutions and distribute information."

Her list of clients reads like a who's who, including the Las Vegas Clark-County Urban League, the World Conference of Mayors, 100 Black Men of America (Las Vegas Chapter). She's also emceed dozens of events and served on numerous nonprofit boards, including Big Brothers, Big Sisters of Southern Nevada, Goodwill Industries, Frontier Girl Scouts Council and the Latin Chamber of Commerce, among others.

Most recently, McMorris moderated a political candidates' forum put on by the Clark County Democratic Black Caucus in association with Clark County Democratic Hispanic Caucus, Asian American Democratic Caucus and the Nevada State Democratic Party Diversity Committee. McMorris has done all of this great work while raising her son and two daughters.

"I love my community and I feel there are so many resources not tapped in to," she said. "I feel they don't know where to go. That's what I do. My specialty is letting people know what resources are available."
