



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

Keep your eye on Maria Desti, curvaceous beauty appearing at the Sands Hotel's Celebrity Theatre. The


Canadian songbird's vocalizing calls for many future encores.

But he never asks a player to do anything he wouldn't do himself. He puts his whole heart into his work and he expects likewise. More, he always knows what he wants as a director. Some directors will say: 'Don't play it that way, do it differently.' Then they won't say HOW to do it differently. Jerry knows exactly and tells his players. He's an actor's actor and director,



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and good ones vie to get into his pictures."

In this film, Jerry plays a double for a gangster who has tried to double cross the mob. All through the film he assumes various disguises to escape. More, Jerry has loaned the actors talent study group at Columbia Studios his own expensive taping and sound equipment to help them.

Dirk and Dak Rambo, the identical twins on the Loretta Young Show, were and are friends of mine. These handsome boys couldn't get work after the Loretta Show closed. They were too identical and it seemed there was no call for twins. Then the army called them but good, and in they went to serve Uncle Sam. It was only recently that they came out to resume show business. We felt it such a pity when they said they were going to rename themselves and try it individually. Being identical handsome twins seemed a pure waste in this Hollywood town. Orman, who was Dirk, went to Universal where he appeared

WARM MAN IN A COLD WINTER: Ahamad Meah runs the Karachi Restaurant, where very excellent Indian and Pakistani food is served. Some weeks back he returned from a visit to Jerusalem and Mecca. The other evening during a visit to his place he handed us a rare gift — some rocks from the Holy Land.

NIGHT OUT: The lights are dim; subdued, subtle jazz goes on and on from 6:00 p.m. to 4:00 a.m.; Shish Kebab and Oriental table fare are available for the hungry. That's Ali Baba East over on First Avenue and 59th Street. We spent 90 minutes lingering at the piano bar drinking in the music making of the two rotating groups. Mike Hatgis, who owns this retreat, where the quietus is applied to outside pressure and tension, has had a winning formula for four years. Louis Metcalf plays soft, cooing trumpet in front of three hard working assistants. After an hour, Jimmy Neeley brings a bassist and drummer on. Neeley's piano noodling is remarkable. His genre is the standard, today's better pop song, yesterday's forgotten tune and a pulsating hunk of jazz. In addition to finding the right note with dispatch, Neeley is a personality seller at the keyboard. At any one time, Ali Baba East is for 113 people who enjoy music, music, music while sipping or supping.

"NO, I'M NOT RELATED": A cabbie whose number is 68109 covers New York by night. For eight years, about sixty people a week, eyeing his name on the identification card, make a comment or ask a question. His nomer is Jose Ferrer. Very good pub-

licity for the actor. If memory serves us, Mel Ferrer had a brother, a doctor in town, also named Jose.

EAT TREAT: Once you get past looking at pewter, swords, rifles, bed warmers, etc., in the area off the bar at Paul Revere's Tavern and Chop House, this replica of an early American inn scores as a fine restaurant. Fritz, the assistant manager, is a veteran greeter. His recommendation of a Beef Broth with Veal Dumplings and Noodles gives him additional points in our note book.

The room, dedicated to the silversmith on horseback, goes all day. Located in the Hotel Lexington on 48th Street, it serves a breakfast, packs them in at lunch and caters to dinner seekers until midnight.

The food and beverage director here is Robert Steiner, a big, friendly fellow. He's been in charge for a year. His plans for the future encompass such menu addenda as casserole dishes and curries. Sunday brunch may also blossom under his guidance, and eventually 190 persons will eat, drink and be merry where 165 are accommodated at present.

The "Dinner Bill," as the menu at Paul Revere's Tavern is called, high-







Spectacles include Niagara Falls, complete with cascades of real water, and an exciting, flaming recap of the Hindenburg disaster. . . . Star of the show is delightful Dave Barry, the famed comedian. He gets huge laughs with very funny new material ranging from fresh thoughts on Vegas gambling, and a hilarious drunk bit, to uncannily accurate vocal sound effects, and recreating some of the voices he does on TV commershills, such as the Hamm's bear. 

And that's Hollywood!


