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

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
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

Smart's" chief).




Sukey Smith, our lovely state representative who won the thousand dollar "Personality" scholarship in the

EDDIE FISHER'S brilliant opening at the Cocoanut Grove, and Jack Jones' smash-hit opening at Jimmy Doolittle's Greek Theatre were theatrical greats — and of special interest to me, since Eddie is married to Connie Stevens and Jack to Jill St. John — two talented beauties who are tops in my book of friends. Both the vivacious starry, twinkling-eyed famous blonde and the glamorous exciting redhead were very much present. You could hear the buzz all over, "Where's Connie Stevens?" And Jill St. John, "I want to get a look!"

Eddie, making his singing entrance on the red plush carpeted stairs of the Cocoanut Grove, began one of the great and memorable nights in perhaps the world's last traditional stance of elegance. The Grove remains the one glamorous room for dressy black tie, diamonds, mink, movie stars, celebrities and mobs of fans behind ropes with their cameras to catch the scene.

Maitre d' Gilbert Paoli, with continental charm and éclat and his staff, and Gus Lamp, who booked the Grove in the hit days of Freddie Martin and other greats, has returned as entertainment director, to bring Grove eminence back to top — give the magic, color, finesse and selectivity. Traditional as a royal court announcement is the spotlight at the head of the famed red stairs, as Connie Stevens, up to her pretty ears in Empress chinchilla, Zsa Zsa Gabor, explaining why she wore a simple black Dior organdy, the celebrated first nighters Dorothy and Harry Jameson (she traditionally in a stunning new gown — this time a Jean Louis chiffon), Eva Gabor in a sweeping long gray chiffon with jeweled empire bodice, Mel Ferrer, each pausing dramatically under the spotlight, before proceeding, down to their tables. In the packed Grove, electric with excitement, delicious vi-

ands were perfectly served and consumed as well, before showtime. Mary Ann Paoli, chic in gray chiffon (gray being the new new popular color this season) whispered she is producing an heir for Gilbert this Fall. More were Mark C. Bloome, the tire king, the Herbert Lufts back from a tour of Europe, and all the lens lads flashbulbing the celebs. Jules Davis shooting a pix of handsome film star Sal Ponti and me, recalled Eddie Fisher's previous Grove opening which we'd all attended with Elizabeth Taylor, who'd just won her fight for life, and bore proudly the scar on her beautiful throat. "The whole world has changed in this short time," observed Jules. "There was no Vietnam then, no race riots. A look around the room and you'll note how many have changed partners as well. So what happened to L-O-V-E of some?"

The old saying that it takes tears and heartbreak to unleash the true depths of emotion and talent of a great artist was well apparent with Eddie, who sang magnificently, just great, and won the standing ovations he well deserved. In singing the Al Jolson songs, he said, "I am always asked why I don't sing my own. I admire Joley so much I will sing his songs until I die." Then he quipped modestly, "I was used to having hits and hits, and then I didn't have any hits. It took some adjusting, but I decided not to adjust, I will keep on singing for more!" Loud applause resounded. Then Eddie gave us "My Papa" and the applause was deafening.

More: "I bought the right of Lowe and Lerner's 'Paint Your Wagon' for \$200 thousand. 'Sound of Music' has grossed over a hundred million. 'My Fair Lady' eight million, and I get this wonderful musical for \$200 thousand. Paramount's made me executive pro-

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
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ducer," and then, "Lee Marvin will sing the songs. I wonder how Lee will do on some of those F's and E's," Eddie laughed. "Anyway, I'll sing them on stage. I love them so!" And he did, as no one has ever sung them before.

Richard Harris introduced Eddie with some comedy acts that sorry to say, fell flat. But Guy Marks' polished artistry and wit were brilliant. Sal observed that Guy, Joey Bishop, Eddie, Mario Lanza and he all came from the same neighborhood in South Philadelphia. Adding color were Eddie Fisher's straw hats and pennants.

At Eddie's champagne party later in the elegant Lautrec, Connie and Eddie were obviously very happy, as well they might be with their darling baby Joely. (I asked Connie if "Joely" was named due to Eddie's admiration for Al Jolson.) "No," she said, "I read the name in a book." They are happily expecting Sir Stork again for Christmas. The way Eddie sang "I love you" to Connie and introduced, "My wife, the prettiest girl in the world," and told of her great successes in Las Veg-

as, made you happy happy for them.

Jack Jones won a standing ovation and cheers at the packed Greek Theatre for some of the classiest vocalizing of the year. He lends his rich voice to a dazzling repertoire of ballads that holds your heart strings, and then he switches with his disarming charm and ease to rock and roll. His "Donkey Serenade" in honor of his father Alan Jones, was swing, but no matter which way he sang he could do no wrong. "Wives and Lovers," "Impossible Dream," and "Old Man River," gave full range to this boy's immense talent. Jill told me she has been traveling, with her bridegroom of course, and may or may not settle down to do a movie in Europe this fall. She stars on the Bob Hope TV Special. Best, she is very happy in her marriage, and like Connie, is wisely putting aside her career as second to her husband's, for true happiness.

Carol Channing To Open A Four-Week Stand At Riviera

IRREPRESSIBLE CAROL CHANNING is set to return to the Versailles Room of Harvey Silbert's Riviera Hotel on Tuesday night Aug. 27 for a four week engagement with the Stone Country musical rock group. It is one of the most expensive shows of its type ever staged.

One part of her show will be the all-new version of "Hello Dolly," with lyrics written specially for Miss Channing by composer Jerry Herman.

She'll also sing "Happy Birthday Abie Baby" from Broadway's outspoken musical, "Hair." When she comes to the naughty word in the lyrics, the drums will drown her out.

My spy in San Juan says, "Miss Channing's imitation of Marlene Dietrich updated is sensational and suspenseful." Carol also does a takeoff mimicing Brigitte Bardot in the sleepwalking scene from MacBeth.

Miss Channing has worked on her one-woman show for a couple of months in her Malibu, California home. She includes a few dance routines.

In 1948, Miss Channing, a fugitive from Vermont's Bennington College, couldn't get a job in the theatre. She retreated from New York to California to be with her parents.

As luck would have it, Marge Champion was auditioning stars for a new revue, "Lend An Ear" and her husband was assigned the director chores of his first major theatre hit. Miss Channing tried out and won the part. This show was transplanted from Hollywood to Broadway and she was on her way to the top.

While in "Lend An Ear," producer Oliver Smith saw Miss Channing and signed her for "Gentlemen Prefer Blondes." Since playing the legendary

flapper she immortalized "I'm Just a Little Girl from Little Rock" and "Diamonds Are a Girl's Best Friend." Both critics and theatregoers have taken the female star to their hearts.

Miss Channing made her nitery debut July 8, 1957 at the Tropicana Hotel and carried such an impact that the show was extended throughout the entire summer. In 1961 this one woman attraction was billed as "Show Girl" and brought to Broadway again where the critics tossed their adjectives in the air placing her alongside Beatrice Lillie.

The brown-eyed 5'8" blond dream was realized in 1962 playing opposite George Burns, which made boxoffice history. The team took its final bow Jan. 28, 1963 and then Carol went on to "Hello, Dolly!," winning the Tony Award in David Merrick's all-time hit.





single, strategically placed rose to style-setting straw skirts), and series of show stopping production numbers and acts. Among the formidable talents on display are the handsome, versatile star, **Jerry Antes**, an excellent singer, especially in his thrilling "**Porgy and Bess**" medley, hilarious **Carazini**, the unbelievable chain smoke-eater, the exciting dance team of **Jacqueline Voltaire** and **Michel Stany**, stunning **Heather Darvi**, and the trumpet star **Bill Chase**. . . . The luscious, limber dancers are called "**Le Ballet des Comedie Francais**," and the least-dressed dolls are "**Les Mannequins de Paris**." . . . The riotous hip fairy tale depicted is based on the legend of "**The Princess and The Pea**." . . . **Frederic Apar** conceived, produced, and directed the new hit, marvelously staged and choreographed by **Ron Lewis**. . . . Those wow costumes were created by **Jose Luis Vinas**. . . . The **Earl Green Orchestra**, conducted by **Bill Chase**, gives the inspired musical score ideal treatment.

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FABULOUS LAS VEGAS

Las Vegas Gambles On Symphony Orchestra

By Raoul Gripenwaldt

LAS VEGAS' BID for culture — the recent, initial concert by the new Las Vegas Symphony, made an auspicious start despite several handicaps. The handicaps included lack of rehearsal time, an acoustically unsatisfactory auditorium and heat.

The concert was held in the 6,000-seat circular **Convention Center** — ideal for conventions but less so for symphony concerts.

We would estimate an attendance of from 1,500 to 2,000 persons in the audience. This is a good sized audience for a city of 100,000 population, but in a 6,000 seat auditorium the attendance looks sparse.

Microphones were needed and the shape of the auditorium made the sound spread so that it lacked focus.

The heat factor was occasioned by the necessity of turning off the air conditioning because the noise drowned out the pianissimos.

Cool Concerts

This problem can be corrected by holding the concerts in cooler months. There isn't much to do about the hall, unless the concerts could be held in one of the large convention halls now under construction at some of the major hotels.

An audience of about 2,000 is about all one can expect from an area the size of Las Vegas. Statistics show that 2,000 persons per 100,000 population represents the saturation point for symphony orchestra patrons.

The orchestra comprises fine musicians, mostly drawn from the hotel orchestras. These musicians were weaned on **Bach** and **Beethoven** and relished the opportunity to perform the classics in concert.

The first chair cellist, for instance, was **Enio Bolognini**, one of the world's foremost cellists.

The concertmaster, **Lou Pressman**

is a distinguished violinist and the harpist was **Kippy Lou Brinkman** who can be found playing the harp in the evening floating on a boat in a "lake" in the middle of the **Dome Of The Sea** restaurant at the **Dunes Hotel**.

Las Vegas proved it had the musical talent for a symphony orchestra.

Leo Damiani, conductor and music director chose an ambitious — perhaps too ambitious — program for the orchestra's debut.

For an opening **Damiani** raced through the overture to "**Russlan and Ludmilla**" by **Glinka**. This gave the late comers time to assemble at the door for the real 'meaty' part of the concert.

FBI Man

The second number served to introduce the guest star of the concert, **Efrem Zimbalist, Jr.** — he of **FBI** (TV) fame.

The work chosen was a difficult one — the late **Charles Maxwell's** "**Prelude and Scene**" based on **Mark Anthony's** famous oration over the bier of **Caesar** — "Friends, Romans and Countrymen — lend me your ears."

Zimbalist lacks the Shakespearean cadence to deliver the oration in the Shakespearean manner. But there is nothing in the book that says it has to be delivered in the Shakespearean manner.

Modern dramatic declamation is just as effective and **Zimbalist** portrayed **Anthony** with the power and subtlety of a political orator.

Maxwell's score is highly dramatic and illustrative and the orchestra negotiated its difficulties with consummate skill, **Damiani** provided firm, cohesive and knowledgeable conducting.

Tough Number

prised the gigantic Verdi "Requiem" for four soloists, chorus and orchestra. This is an undertaking which a less skilled conductor might have thought twice about scheduling on an initial concert - and one which the budget permitted only three rehearsals, but the Requiem went exceedingly well.

The chorus was that of The Las Vegas Music Arts Workshop trained by Edward Brahms. Soloists were Nancy Helm, soprano; Maxine Deacon, mezzo; James Lemos, baritone and Edgar Harrism tenor.

The soloists were all adequate and achieved considerable success in ensemble and solo stanzas.

The ragged edges of the choral attacks are understandable when one considers that this was a non-professional chorus.

The chorus demonstrated considerable sonority and the climaxes were thrilling and clean. They managed volume with clarity.

Damiani is a sound musician and a dynamic figure on the podium. He welds his charges with a fine hand

and elicits a cohesive quality which is exciting as well as artistic.
