


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

## THE HAND OF GOD



## Lights of Las Vegas

TODAY'S awe-inspiring NOW edition of the Folies Bergere is without a doubt the best spectacular seen at the Tropicana Hotel in the past four years. It has all the knowhow of a Hollywood extravaganza and is more exciting than in Paris.

Magnificently costumed, with excellent choreography by Tony Charmoli, makes it an attractive offering. The night Yours Truly saw the "Folies" the showgoers were very receptive from the opening number to the finale. It is a well paced, fast moving show.

Lavish in many respects, the timing throughout is quick and each of the acts is one of the best the well known Strip has to offer. "Folies" maintains the dignity and tradition of its 100 years plus past.

Talented comedienne-singer Sue Carson should rate top billing as this gal can do no wrong. The only thing wrong about her act is that her 15 minute stand is a bit short. She rates an "E" for excellent with her impressions of Barbra Streisand, Pearl Bailey and Lena Horne. The manner of presentation is very convincing and Miss Carson has a great sense of humor.

The brother and sister juggling duo of Valente Valente from Spain, are the best of the newcomers. They use bowling pins, plates, balls and eventually use ping-pong balls in rapid fire order from the mouth that is really something to see. Seeing is believing.

Pomhoff Thedy Family, the Spanish imports, offer pantomime antics which resemble the Marx Brothers. The two Marty Brothers are top comedy acrobats giving the audience many laughs using a piano, violin, clarinet and wigs as props. They are hilarious in their short stint.

Gus Augspurg and his girl friends of a Phoebus monkey and a Gibbon bab-

oon are a well trained team and warmly accepted. The two females react very quickly to the commands of their master. Vassili Sulich and Pat La Forge in their near-nude number of "Feast of the Spider" are an outstanding dance team.

The 90 minute spectacular with a cast of 100 and cost of \$800 thousand is a thing of beauty — girls and scenery plus costumes. "Folies Bergere" was conceived by Michel Gyarmathy and Maynard Sloate with orchestrations by Henri Betti, arrangements by Jerry Fielding and Si Zentner handling the baton.

If there weren't nudes, it would be a family type show. We recommend it highly and this extravaganza is on our list as a "must see" show.

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

more national impact than his stage role stirred up on Broadway. Six years ago, said Prideaux: "Picking future stars among young beginners is a good guessing game. Another form of the game I like to play is spotting actors who are stalled on a high level of competence, but are capable of doing bigger things. They stand on the sill of stardom and need only a shove or a break to step over. James Earl Jones, who has been a respected young actor for several years, belongs in this category."

### HOBNOBBING WITH HALL OF FAMERS

In the Thirties, the halcyon days of baseball, Bill Dickey was a remarkable catcher and steady, dependable hitter for the New York Yankees. Wearing the livery of the Detroit Tigers was Charley Gehringer, pretty much the perfect second baseman. He was a flawless fielder and his bat spoke very well for him. Both men were rewarded after their respective retirements by being voted into the shrine at Cooperstown, N.Y. On a recent Saturday night we sat with them chewing anecdotal material about the diamond. Dickey was the late Lou Gehrig's roomie for 11 years. He would like to dispel, once and for all, the quoted comment that the big first baseman was cheap, a bad tipper. "Completely wrong," said Dickey, "he was a sweet generous man; the strongest fellow I ever knew. It was a terrible thing to see him go. Living with him in 1939 I saw that lateral multiple sclerosis destroying him. One night he tried to open a bottle of catsup. He couldn't; he asked me to try. Normally, that chore was nothing for him. Probably he could open one with a finger. When I tried, it was just a simple turn. Right there I knew Gehrig was a mighty sick man — with little time left."



Then there are those who take drugs just to be accepted. Others indulge for the pure thrill and excitement. But, such thrill and excitement must take its toll on the mind and the body.

Actually, those taking the most dangerous variety of drugs realize to a certain extent what they are doing to themselves.

On the subject of L.S.D., its effect is not temporary. The aftereffect remains with the person who has taken it. After prolonged use, it limits rational thinking. In other instances, it can be an eye opener. One who is confused may believe the only solution is in drugs. After he takes them, he discovers they are a form of escape and that he must face reality and deal with his problems intelligently.

Parents who suspect their offspring is experimenting with narcotics must discuss the subject openly and honestly with their children . . . not with malice . . . but with sincere curiosity.

Parents who have never had the drug habit don't really know what it is all about but they must learn . . . in order to help.

★ ★ ★

This generation is faced with so many problems, at times escape seems the only answer. Some feel they are not equipped to cope with the issues of school, parents, early sex knowledge and world affairs.

As far as Marijuana is concerned, the jury still hasn't come in with a verdict of potential danger or non-danger.

If you agree that drugs aren't the answer, get interested in something you dig. Join a group, race cars, go out and talk to other people who feel the same as you do. If you think drugs are the answer, carefully evaluate your thoughts. Do not make a hasty decision.

★ ★ ★

If you've used drugs in the past and are leery of the results, it would be wise for you to talk to your family physician. He will help — not hurt you. That's what he's here for. He'll answer all queries about the subject and the consequences.

If any of your friends are really strung out on drugs, you can help by just being a friend, for they really need a good friend and a lot of talk. This is a problem that can neither be overlooked nor over emphasized. You cannot use scare tactics while dealing with it. Handle it only with facts!

There is a definite danger in the abuse of drugs. The result is mind shattering!



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


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
