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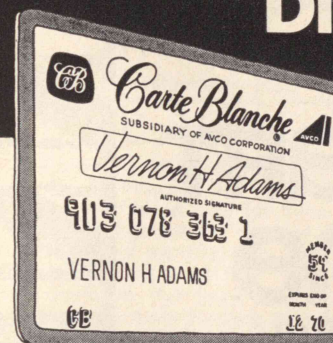
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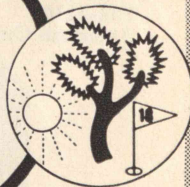

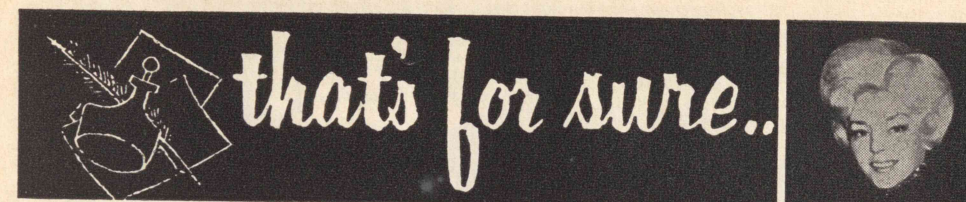
FAREWELL

When you roam through the Desert Inn, you summon vivid memories of the men who created and directed it . . . men who knew the only way to bring in the players was to give them what they wanted . . . a fair exchange for their money. In those days, a steady client was accorded a complimentary room, and/or board and beverage . . . with no one peering over the edge of his glasses to warn "it does not compute." The customer was important, very important, to men like Wilbur Clark, Moe Dalitz, Tom McGinty, Ruby Kolod, George Gordon, C. J. Jones . . . et al . . .

We chased their shadows around the Inn, wondering at their reaction to current happenings, and found them (some deceased — others removed by happenstance) with deep shadows in questioning eyes . . . Weeding out the handful of savvy key personnel left at the Inn, we wondered if they too would soon be leaving . . . unless . . .

Talk is growing stronger that certain hotels will be put on the block, the Desert Inn first. That makes sense, a possible D.I. sale, or reversion to former management. This hotel is leased, was never actually purchased by the enigmatic H.H.

FABULOUS has devoted itself to the life and people of this town, OUR town. Nearing our 25th Anniversary, we just wonder if there will be cause to celebrate. So many want to throw in the towel — the crying towel — because the Golden Goose is on strike . . . Conditions are at an all-time low when a bartender is called on the carpet for supplying a performer with a soda at the service bar, to moisten a throat headed for an hour in the spotlight.

Computers cannot elicit loyalty. Money can buy talent and ability — but not loyalty. This was the contri-

bution yesterday's key men made to their bosses. Of course it wasn't all hearts and flowers even then — but the bosses had open ears for all suggestions that bettered the business and town. The results paid off in spades.

It isn't the presence of the corporate entity that is to blame for the cold aura of aloofness that is sensed by the tourist and employee, alike . . . it's the lack of gaming experts at the helm. Las Vegas is not Madison Avenue or Beverly Hills. It is a gaming mecca — and ONLY gaming expertise will keep our town healthy. As long as we are to abide with the Gaming Commissioners' permission of corporate takeover, then the corporation heads had better be apprized of the necessity of keeping the industry in the hands of men who know how to keep shop. The corporations that have retained gaming heads (with full responsibility) are doing a thriving business. Their casinos are chieftained by men long in the industry . . . men who draw locals and tourists alike with reasonable prices and warm attitudes . . . a very simple formula . . . the Golden Rule . . . Flesh and blood doesn't react kindly to the rebuke of

Hitchhiking, he slept in the fields, stealing lemons along the way to sustain him. Lying on his back, looking up at the sky, he wrote **"The Little White Cloud That Cried"** — the rest is history. **Johnnie** holds the record as the only American who appeared at the **London Palladium** seven times. It isn't just a rumor that other lounges are going to be closed — it's definite that they will fade from the scene. Lounge stars in most of the hotels are being called in to executive offices and asked to play out

their contracts in the main rooms . . . The die has been cast . . . Vaya con dios!

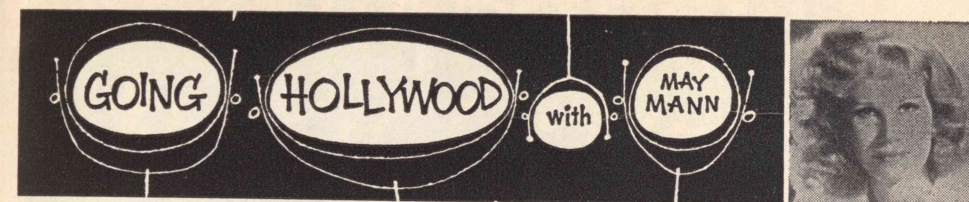
Leaving it all behind for two days, we flew to Lake Tahoe, where we caught **Sammy Davis, Jr.**'s opening at **Harrah's**. He tore the house down when he walked onstage in brown hotpants, pale yellow, wide-sleeved shirt, topped with a brown and red glitter vest, with boots. The \$9 minimum crowd gave him a standing ovation. (**Sammy** is the first star to tape a guesting on TV's **"All In The Family."**) During his segment of miming a variety of stars singing **"All The Way,"** his carbon of **Jerry Lewis** drew the most resounding applause . . . and they loved **Sammy's "Bojangles,"** accented with whistling and his great taps, amplified by the mike he casually dangled near his feet. Another rouser is his rendition of **Russ Morgan's "You're Nobody Till Somebody Loves You."**

Meeting **Danny Thomas** at the airport, he assured us he was dead serious about the telethon he suggested the performers put on to provide the county with a courthouse. **Danny** didn't believe there would be any problem in getting the entertainers to kitty up a quarter of a million dollars themselves . . . "I just take that bike up there, and hope it all works out every time I jump — Hell, I'm the best, the last of the daredevils, and my death — it will be glorious!" How he will jump the mile-length of the Grand Canyon, his goal, seems unbelievable. But so is everything else he has done and does. You see his almost fateful jump at **Caesars Palace**. You marvel at his guts, to be up and back — what with every bone in his body broken one time or another. You discover he was often in jail as a youth in Montana.

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He did such daring things like blowing up the city hall with dynamite. The sheer ego and neuroticism of the man is clearly revealed by Mr. Hamilton, who again proves in this, another new characterization, that he is one of the best there is, too! When Evel includes Elvis and Sinatra as fellow stars, he should. For Evel is tops in his field — and what a suicidal field it is. George Hamilton makes him so real, you find yourself rooting for him — even for his Grand Canyon jump. Credit is due to George Hamilton as producer, for there's not a second's lag in the entire picture, which keeps an exciting pace from the opening second. This is a family film and "a don't miss it!"

"Victory Canteen," the local hit produced by Milt Larson, Bob Lauher and the Sherman Bros. (who wrote it all), is now in its sixth month — says P.R. Shirley Carroll, the new L.A. Advertising Club prexy. Even with critics' opening raves, its producers have been cutting and adding. It's

great fun with Broadway and Vegas coming up. . . . Belle and Abe Greenberg happily celebrated the anniversary of their first heir which is a big hit: "Entertainment Today." . . . At the Luau glimpsed Sandy Martin and Joe Groman, Claire Windsor and Joe Keen, Barbara and Bill Williams, Dino Martin and Olivia Hussey, Claudia Martin and Terry Melcher, the latter who are setting a Fall wedding date, and the Jack Dempseys in from New York.

MARY Francis Reynolds, better known in show business as Debbie Reynolds returns to the Desert Inn Hotel for a four week stand beginning July 27 with her own show.

The multi-talented star will present a show featuring her two children, Carrie and Todd Fisher. The two youngsters are from Miss Reynolds' previous marriage to entertainer Eddie Fisher.

This revue is based on family routines, solos, impersonations, humor and production numbers with Jerry Antes and Jeff Parker.

Last summer Carrie, 14, joined her mother for a tour of the East, working some tents and theatres as a singer. She began to concentrate on vocal training and ballet lately. There's talk already of her becoming an actress as she has good stage presence.

Todd, 13, is not so sure of a show business career. He plays the guitar well, but hasn't made up his mind what he wants to do.

Debbie has spent 22 years of her life in the entertainment field and has had her ups and downs.

In 1951 Miss Reynolds copped an ingenue lead in what some critics call the best musical of all-time, "Singing in the Rain," with Gene Kelly, Donald O'Connor and Jean Hagen.

Miss Reynolds is very discouraged with the movies of today. "Musicals are a thing of the past," she says. "You're now seeing the end of the movie industry. I haven't read any new properties that I like. There's too much obvious sex, too much nudity. There's no mystery, no romance. The whole thing is who can you get in the sack."

Some of the numbers by Carrie and Todd include "Bridge Over

Troubled Waters," "People Got To Be Free" and a medley of tunes written by Bobby Darin with Debbie joining in.

Will the Summer season as stars change the children's lives when they return to home and school? Miss Reynolds thinks not as they were reared in show business and live in a community where everyone is in show business. All she hopes for is that the proper values have been instilled in her children and they continue with a normal family life.

Now to get down to next weeks' mind snapper. Let's go back to the Westerns. In the middle thirties, there was a trio called the Three Mesquiteers: Name the three cowboy stars who originated the roles. A fairly easy one with the answer next week.

About a week ago I dropped by Circus Circus to catch a new revue in the Ring-ading bar called "Hot Pants Sexplosion." In case you don't know, it is six different shows, one every thirty minutes, from 1:00 A.M. till 6:00 A.M. First of all, let me say this. The girls are the prettiest you'll ever see in this town . . . Wally Scott on organ and Bill King on drums work like mad during the show and sometimes in between. Earl Humphries makes a capable MC and fairly good singer. Sheila Sparr is gorgeous, extremely talented, very well endowed, and for the most part, sings material not suited for her. It moves fast, true. In fact, I found the time fairly flew the five hours I was there.

The highlight for me was the superior presence of Marty May who deserves a much better vehicle for his talents but the name of this game is: keep working. But then again, Marty paid his dues when most of us were just learning the ABC's. If you laugh at the blackouts it's because of Marty. I am not a prude as those of you who know me are aware . . . BUT some of the language in this mini review belongs back in the men's locker room. Most of the dance numbers are topless which I don't mind one bit . . . NO SIR. But again, a couple of

the numbers featuring two of the lovelies left me cold. I found myself looking away until it was over. Seeing two girls with romantic intentions (simulated, of course) leaves me cold. But then again, who am I to say what is right or wrong for you. 75% of the time I was entertained but the other 25% lost me. See it and make your own conclusion.

How come so many teen-agers can be seen leaning over the railing above the Ring-ading Bar at 1:30 or 2:00 A.M. while the show is going on?

Across the street at the Riviera Hotel's Starlite Theatre, Vic Damone is back and, as always, in superb voice. One would think his much publicized financial troubles would have some effect on him as he performs. If it has, it was not in evidence the night I caught him. Vic also had ten new men in his band which did not hinder him one bit. Vic still has the best voice in the world and good rapport with the audience. I've written so much about Vic Damone during the past three years, there's nothing left to say. He's the best. The "Tiger" is back . . . bigger and better than ever.

Jackie Gayle . . . the wildest and cleverest comic on the show scene today. It took time but he and the Sahara Casbar finally found each other. No other funny man working today can approach Jackie in the wild and topical comedy he does. I would have to say that Jackie and Shooky

RECORDED SONGS, ACCLAIM FOR THE MEN WHO RHYMED AND CREATED THE NOTES, PLUS A SPECIAL EVENING IN THE COMPANY OF ONE OF THE BEST IN THE CRAFT:

Some gratitude is due Crewe Records for putting out what we hope will be a never ending series. The plan, devised by one Ben Bagley, reclaims a whole bundle of songs written by the greats of the business. Most of the tunes never received much popularity. Some were hidden away in shows of the past. Whatever the reason, a good percentage have merit. In some cases the rhyming structure is brilliant, in others the melody is catchy. In quite a few instances, both hit the spot years away from original projection. Thus under the umbrella title of "Rodgers and Hart Revisited Vol. II," "Arthur Schwartz Revisited," "Harold Arlen Revisited" and "Vernon Duke Revisited," we have an opportunity to discover or rediscover, as the case may be, some lyrical or lilting legacies that incurable music lovers or show buffs will find full of new splendor. The singing highlights come through Blossom Dearie's breathy intimacy; Gloria De Haven's surprising bright delivery; Bobby Short with more voice, making like a stage singer and a half dozen other names. Ben Bagley, a tireless, appreciative producer, who, though totally irreverent, has a coalescent position when it comes to disseminating disks of class. It is he who rates the genuflection and the handclaps. Seekers of piquant New York nocturnes will find Bagley Revisited their bag... The Songwriters' Hall of Fame Dinner at the New York Hilton was the culmination of

1400 members nominating and finally voting for new entrees into this Hall of Distinction. Richard Rodgers needed no votes, mere acclamation. Frank Sinatra was on hand, gracious and humble, to present R.R. with the symbolic statuette of a pianola. Lee Wiley, a love of the jazz singer cult, was wonderful. And Allan Jones thrilled ancient, venerable, vital 91 year old Rudolf Friml with "Donkey's Serenade" (about the way he did it more than 32 years ago in the movies), plus Margaret Whiting, in great voice, singing one of her late father's creations. Inducted were Arlen, Carmichael, Ellington, Fields, Friml, Ira Gershwin, Lerner, Mercer, Van Heusen and Warren. It turned out to be a remarkable evening of commemoration... Then there was Johnny Mercer's turn to bask in the spotlight at session four of "Lyrics and Lyricists" at the 92nd St. Y. What can you say about John. His words speak so eloquently for him. He is a painter of pastoral scenes, a delineator of folk phrases, a humorist in rhyme and a sagacious ballad writer. And one sensational demonstrator of his own goods. Like Shakespeare would have

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
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
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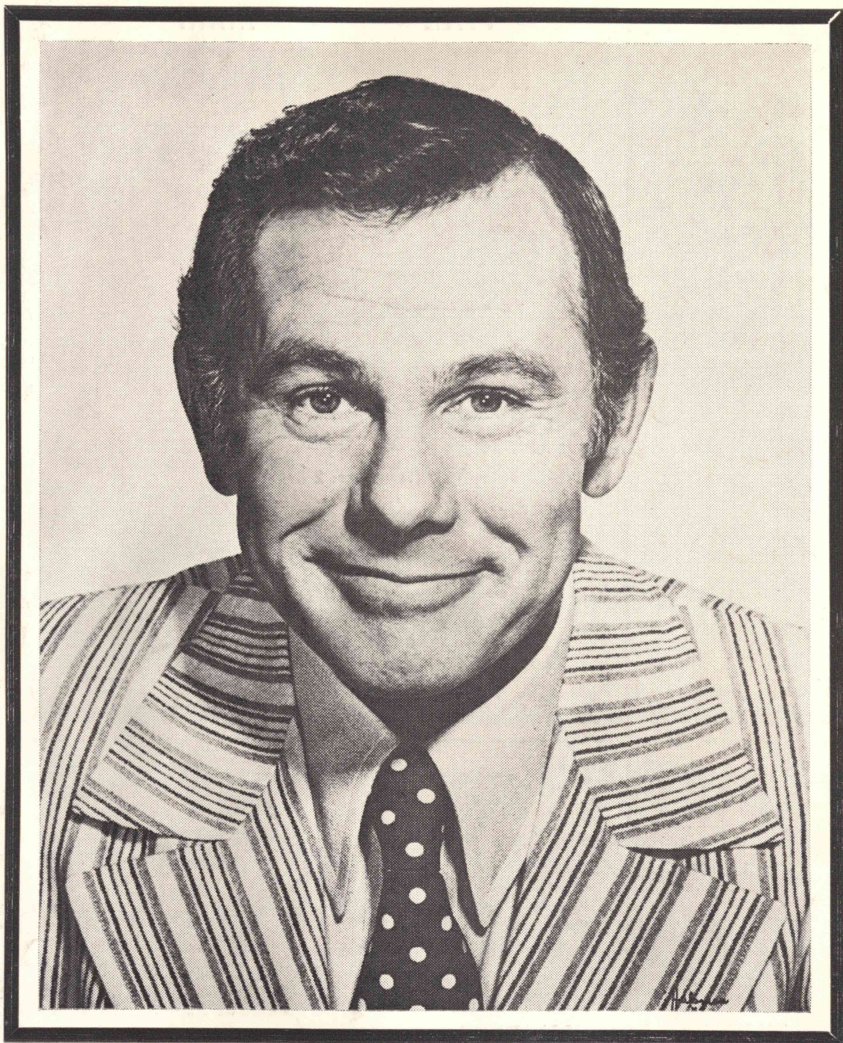
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
