


ROCKING CHAIR GOSSIP

THE McCARTHY LEGEND!




of hardship.

Lights of Las Vegas

California Legislature will make an all out effort to legalize Nevada-style casinos, dog racing, lotteries and jai alai in 1972. Rather than railroad a bill through this year it was decided that all facts must be weighed without changes at a later date.

Chief purpose of the bill is to accustom the public to the idea and allow gambling advocates a chance to muster support.

Parke Terry, consultant to the Assembly Governmental Organization Committee, which must pass on all gambling legislation said, "Not many members of Legislature are ready at this point to stick their necks out."

Many groups are interested in building showrooms and casinos. No mention has been made on construction of hotels at this time. In order to lure gamblers top notch entertainment would be required.

Gov. Ronald Reagan indicated he was willing to listen to proposals if a bill was presented properly.

Gambling as a possible source of government revenue appears to be growing in popularity as government costs continue to increase and traditional forms of taxation become more and more unpopular.

The state has to establish a nine-member Gambling Commission to explore the feasibility of opening four designated areas patterned to Nevada-style gambling.

There have been some unusual alliances between various sports teams and churches. California Angels and L.A. Dodgers voiced opposition, fearing it would take fans away from their stadiums. Church groups found themselves on the same side but for totally different reasons. Opposition by the church was based chiefly on moral arguments.

Last month Atty. Gen. Evelle J. Younger released to the Legislature the findings of a special task force on gambling and in the report said California should not legalize the casino-type gambling.

Just what effect his report will have remains to be seen when gambling bills come before Legislature again next year.

Some assemblymen have hinted that Nevada gambling interests were putting up money for the opposition, but there is no evidence to indicate any such support.

A recent survey showed 68 per cent of the people that go to Nevada come from California. If California should legalize gambling it would be a big blow and many of the hotels in Nevada would have to shutter in time.

International Hotel headliner Perry Como was signed for a two week stand at Harrah's, Tahoe starting Aug. 19 with Foster Brooks and The Establishment in support . . . Through all the rich foods and excursions on the wine trail, our touring lady of the tables comes across as anything but a debaucher. There is much good humor, endless research, respect for an inspiring husband, appreciation for kitchen artistry and a lot of good advice on ordering.

A MINSTREL SINGS AGAIN: Another happy experience at the Museum of Modern Art. This time young Miles Kreuger, author of a soon to be read book "The American Musical Film," unreeled "The Singing Fool," 1928 vintage. The vibrant Al Jolson in a story that went like this. Singing waiter with songwriter ambitions wants girl. Girl doesn't want singing waiter with tune creation talents. But, alas, one of his songs, dedicated to her, is heard by a Broadway producer who flips over the ditty. So calculating femme succumbs and weds Al. Little boy results from the marriage. She scorns. Al goes into personal depression. Little lad dies and so on and so on. But Jolson in this early part talkie sings his heart out. The film offers documentation to attest to Jolson's greatness as a performer. Had as much electricity as an Edison plant. *(Continued on Page 33)*

A tribute to the songs of fellow Islander, Kui Okalani Lee, is a dramatic midpoint and with a return to Lee's prophetic (he died not too long ago), "I'd Do It All Over Again," for the strong curtain lament, the circle is completed . . . The two Duncan Sisters lend their fine blend to many of the Jensen vocalistics and, earlier, the Tihatis Dancers exhibit their Poly-

nesian pelvic exercises beautifully, spelled by two athletic fellows doing the slapdance from Samoa, a gal doing the knife dance, also from Samoa, and a wild-eyed native male from that same Pacific paradise romping through the dangerous knife dance . . . The wedding celebration vis-a-vis of Leilani Kahoanu and Joe Reca, vowing their love in the song, "Ke Kali Ne Au," is a pleasant aural and visual conclusion to the early period on Polynesia . . . George Simone and Jensen combined for production and direction, aided by Tommy Sands . . . Charlene Thompson developed the choreography and Bill de Angelis is credited with stage direction for the Landmark . . . Don Costa's powerful arrangements are obviously inspiring
