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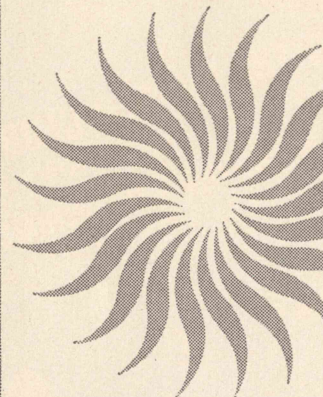

Lights of Las Vegas

LAS VEGAS — Never before has this pillar tried to prognosticate the future of the Entertainment Capitol of the World, but 1973 seems to be shaping up as the brightest year for the economy.

Various income figures compiled showed a 9 percent increase in 1972 over 1971 which included conventions, tourism, construction, gaming, livestock, agriculture and mining. This is a healthy situation.

Many years ago mining was the backbone of this state and fortunes were made. No longer does it lead the field even though **Howard Hughes** has hundreds of mining claims. Last year the mineral output came close to \$185 million.

Tourism and conventions show promise of having the biggest year ever with close to 30,000 rooms and suites available. More than 400 conventions were booked last year bringing almost 500,000 people. The projected convention schedule for 1973 is ahead of last year.

Nevada Highway Dep't. plans to make an accurate count on the number of tourists for 1973. It is estimated that 20 million people will come here and spend an average of \$42 a day.

Ten years ago everybody was saying the hotels were overbuilding and there wouldn't be enough tourist trade to fill the rooms. At this point every hotel wishes it had more available land for additions.

Hotel construction is at an all-time high. **MGM's Grand Hotel** will be completed in Oct. and the **Showboat** highrise will be completed shortly adding another 3,000 rooms. **Marc Anthony** on the **Thunderbird** site will break ground in early Summer for another 2,000 rooms.

Northern Nevada is keeping pace as

Bill Harrah opens his new tower at Lake Tahoe in July, **Harvey's Wagon Wheel Hotel** expansion of \$2½ million will be ready by Summer and another 1,000 room complex close by.

Nevada state treasury has an enviable position compared to other states. They have close to \$88 million on hand. Last year they had \$63 million. By 1974 there will be more than \$100 million in the till.

The entertainment field seems to be having a rough time due to not making any future stars. Present crop of entertainers will have no drawing power in the next five years and where do we go then? It's later than we think and something should be done immediately to develop new talent.

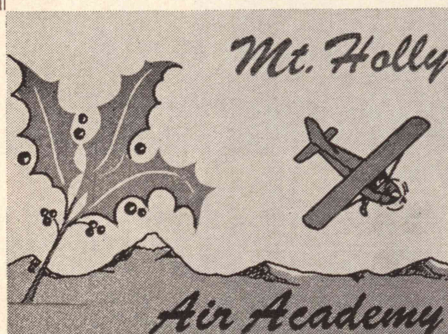

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FABULOUS LAS VEGAS

The Hollywood Chef

I recently appeared on Paul Wal-lach's television show, "All About Restaurants," on channel 3 (cable television) in the Newport-Balboa area of Southern California. Helmut Petrak, one of the three owners of "The Three Greenhorns" restaurants was a guest also. Helmut prepared several dishes for us and invited us to his restaurant in the Quality Inn Hotel in Anaheim, California.

Helmut is the host currently at the "Three Greenhorns" as well as supervising the kitchen. From the moment you enter his restaurant, you know he cares. The service is impeccable, the dining leisurely and the surroundings are warm and comfortable.

Recently at lunch he gave me some of his recipes to share with you. Just in case you are not near one of his five restaurants you can prepare these dishes at home.

Lobster Bisque

This is the easiest of the recipes and one that you can do in any part of the world you may live in. Simply buy a good quality of lobster bisque and prepare to manufacturer's direction. Decorate with a few pieces of canned or frozen lobster, shrimp or crab legs. Instead of serving the bisque in a soup bowl, serve it in an attractive sea shell.

All of these recipes were presented by the "Three Greenhorns" at the annual Pacific National Exhibition in Vancouver, B. C., Canada. Here is one of my favorite entrees at the "Three Greenhorns."

Filet of Sole "Papa Louis"

3 2 oz. filets of sole
1 tbs. butter
1 oz. thick cream
1 dash Grand Marnier
1 dash Cognac
½ lemon

1 tsp. slivered toasted almonds
Salt and Pepper to taste

Heat skillet. Season filet of sole, dredge lightly in flour. Saute in butter. Add thick cream, Grand Marnier and Cognac. Simmer for a few seconds. Add lemon juice. Remove from heat, sprinkle with toasted almonds. This can be served with parsley potatoes.

The restaurant is a living memorial to the first three men who settled what today is known as Vancouver, B. C., Canada. John Morton, Sam Brighthouse and William Hailstone were three Yorkshire men who came to the Cariboo Gold Rush in 1862. When they bought the land for \$1.00 an acre, the settlers called them the "Three Greenhorns." The restaurants reflect the history of western Canada in their decor as well as the menu. Helmut Petrak has traveled and worked all over the world in the hotel and restaurant business. His recipes are a reflection of his many experiences.

The dessert menu is as varied as the lunch and dinner menus. I chose Grand Marnier Sorbet because it is not only so pleasing to the appetite

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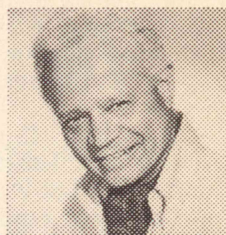
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Grand Marnier Sorbet

4 scoops of orange sherbet
2 slices of pineapple rings
4 jiggers of Grand Marnier
½ bottle of Champagne

Place one scoop of ice cream in a tall glass. Decorate with ½ slice of pineapple. Add 1 jigger of Grand Marnier. Fill with Champagne. Serve with straw and spoon. Serves four.

You can find the "Greenhorn" restaurants in Vancouver and Calgary, Canada as well as Anaheim and San Francisco, California. They are worthy of your visit.

Just below where the clouds form in the urbane sanctuary known as the Rainbow Room the celebration is the Fortnight of Greece. Imagine imported Hellenic chefs and dancing waiters. Entertainers with spirit and culinary achievements with lamb washed down with any one of 47 wines. The last one up the 65 flights takes a bath in Ouzo and gets sprayed with Metaxa. . . . Those Wednesday 5:45 Interludes are back at Town Hall and what a list of names for the weekly hour's performance. The magic word is — commendable — and no duck comes down from the ceiling as you listen to Julius unburden himself.

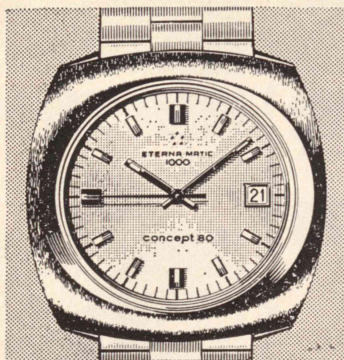

An audience participation bit in which **Jackie** analyzes ringsiders by their astrological signs is sure-fire hilarity . . . **Elvis' own** musicians front the exciting **Joe Guercio Orchestra**, informally clad for the occasion in attractive, embroidered overblouses. 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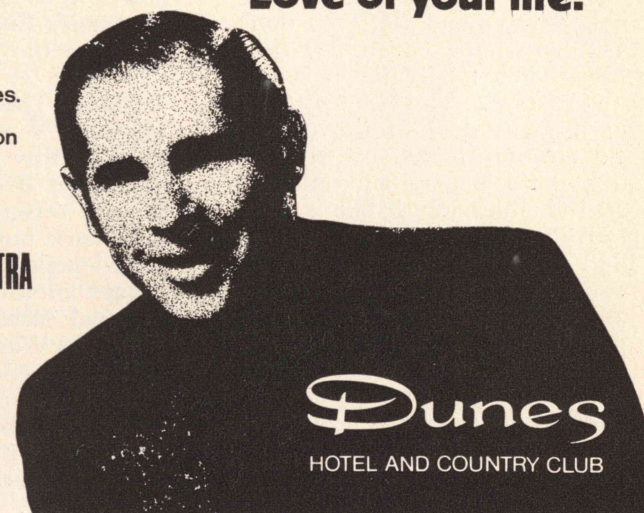

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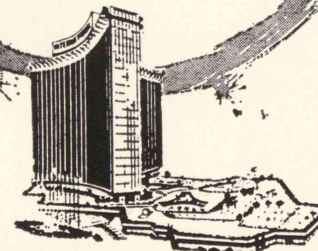
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
