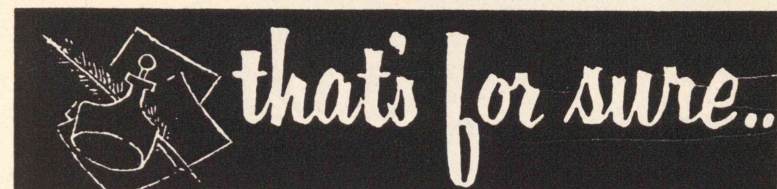

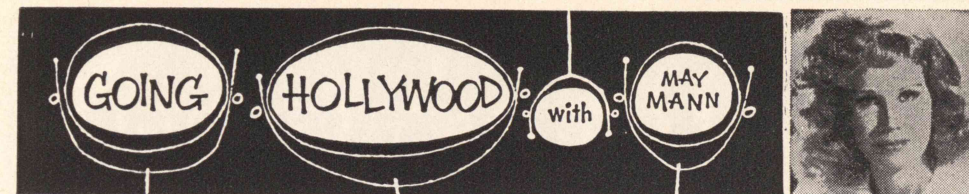
The Riverboat Queen may open on July 2nd after all, with the Mickie Finn Show in its showroom, aptly named the Mark Twain Theatre

# Lights of Las Vegas

The Jerry Lewis Muscular Dystrophy Labor Day Weekend Telethon will originate from the Entertainment Capital of the World this year.

National chairman Lewis said that the 20 hour super show will be completely restructured into 20 interconnected one hour specials, each with its own entertainment theme.

Working under Lewis' direction to give this year's telethon its new look will be veteran Hollywood showman Joel Rogosin, named as producer. The famed comedian cited Rogosin's previous credits as producer of "The Bold Ones," "Ironside," "The Virginian" and other notable T.V. series as assurance that the show would include many dramatic elements within its overall comedy entertainment format.

This year's telethon will originate from Del Webb's Sahara Hotel, which is donating all its public facilities and the services of its staff to the gala holiday weekend event.

The TV spectacular in the preceding seven years raised \$26.5 million for the fight to save the lives of many. It is dedicated to the scientific conquest and neuromuscular diseases through basic and applied research into nerve, muscle and metabolism. The show will be seen nationwide over 150 stations, the largest network ever assembled for a telethon. "By moving to Las Vegas this year," Lewis said "we're taking the show where the talent is on Labor Day."

Frequent pick-ups from New York, Nashville and L.A. will be made. Pattern of the show will interweave the best of the New York theatre, concert stage and the best of Nashville's country-western music with top name talent from Las Vegas and Hollywood.

Sahara V.P. Richard D. Schofield in welcoming Telethon '73 to this city said, "Along with the rest of the country we've always admired Jerry Lewis' achievements, through his annual telethon, in the battle against Muscular Dystrophy. To be able to host this event is an honor and a privilege for the City of Las Vegas."

The Jerry Lewis Telethon, networked in the United States by Hughes Television, is also scheduled to be seen for the first time this year outside the mainland—in Hawaii, Alaska, Puerto Rico and Guam.

The 1972 show saw \$9.2 million pledged to MDAA, of which 99 per cent was collected. Don't forget the date and pledge what you can afford, as the money is for a great cause.

DATELINE: NEW YORK:

There was much less of an odium among people then. Times were bad, bread (either way you translate it) was short, but damn it, there was hope. Most people aspired to be somebody. If drugs were in use it was a private matter. We can't remember one case of a heroin hound mugging an old lady for the price of a fix. Breathing was easier in those days. Fewer cars, less toxic stuff blowing out of the shafts of industry.

Once a couple of years back, we made a case for the songs of the Thirties. It was a decade, as best we recall, when country music was a rare sound in urban areas on the Atlantic Coast and almost all the output of Tin Pan Alley, save the novelty tunes, had recognizable melodies and in most cases, bright, clever, poignant lyrics. One man in the crowd of pro songwriters was Mack Gordon. He was a large, bouncy guy who carried his 270 pounds or more with a decided lightness. Maybe it was because he was all enthusiasm and every fibre of him vibrated. Mack was a lyricist by trade. His early partner was a natty little Englishman who constructed melodies. His name was Harry Revel. To Gordon's credit before the Gordon and Revel teaming was a song called "Time On My Hands" written in conjunction with another word man, Harold Adamson and composer par excellence, Vincent Youmans. It turned up in a show called "Smiles" (1930). The production lasted 63 performances. It served to break the affable Gordon into the big

time of songdom. His words glistened about "moments to share with someone you care for. One love affair for two." We loved it then. It still carries a wallop to this day.

Our rectilinear approach is say it right out. Mack Gordon was these things - fine, guy, a superior demonstrator of his wares and a word magician. He was a manufacturer of semantics. At times we could have assumed he was a Winchell contributor.

This apotheosis of Gordon is not to say he was the equal of Ira Gershwin, Larry Hart or Cole Porter. Nothing like that. Our purpose is to applaud him, posthumously, as an out and out pop songwriter. He added nothing to the Broadway stage, save "Time On My Hands." He was a terrific supplier to the movies. First with Revel and later with the prolific Harry Warren, Mack was responsible for very singable product. That's right, singable words.

You don't do a mini thesis of this kind without offering samples of your declarations.

There was an individual stamp to this man's work. An original word wedding was as good a Gordonism as any to identify his contribution. Though again, sans cleverness, one of his best efforts was a simple song, "You'll Never Know," devoid of any crafty construction and merged to a Warren melody that was born out of Harry remembering how to adapt a form of bugle call, to wit: G, C, E, G, E, C, G, G#, A, D - if you're a piano.

Gordon had a sense of humor in his early days when he and Revel wrote special material for Ben Bernie and George Olsen, two giant names of orchestralia. These come to mind -

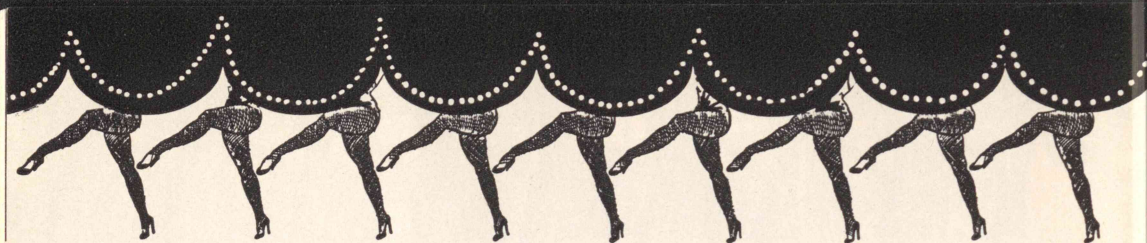

When **Tormé** encores with "The Party's Over," that is the feeling in the room — it's been a party indeed! . . . **Dick Shawn** is another incomparable. A vision in brown leather and a wild hairdo, the comedy star munches a banana — while eyeing the hysterical crowd suspiciously — as punctuation between such gems as his "opening song" bit, observations on the reasons for lack of kamikaze pilots, the trend toward football specialists, and a side-splitting baseball ballet pantomime of pitchers of the future . . . **Shawn's** convulsing impression of modern singers doing their hits, his graceful,

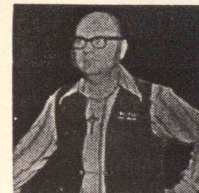

"I played fiddle for the Czar and when he had a cold I played catarrh" ("I Played Fiddle For The Czar"), "When those little German gents play instruments the audience commence to 'dense'" ("Listen To The German Band") and "Creole babies walk along with rhythm in their eyes, rhythm in their lips and in their hips and in their thighs" ("Underneath The Harlem Moon").

Had the boy soprano, child immigrant from Poland lived, he would have been 69 last June 21st. His career as a lyricist stopped abruptly fourteen years ago.

Away with the maudlin and the morose nostalgia. Recall the lithe fat man who wrote such pleasant possibilities as "having my fun kissing the sun" in "I Feel Like A Feather In The Breeze" and "you have so many thrillables that I've run out of syllables" for "From The Top Of Your Head To The Tip Of Your Toes." These are two custom tailored examples of the man's thoughts and his skill. Forget not that he penned such outright smashes as "Did You Ever See A Dream Walking," "Stay As Sweet As You Are" and "Goodnight, My Love" in the 1933 to 1936 period.

Some other creative blendings taken out of context are "the heavenaboveliness, the loveliness of you" from "The Loveliness Of You" and "matter of factly don't know exactly" as per "You Hit The Spot." Near the finish of his illustrious career, in collaborating with **Josef Myrow**, he painted frothy word pictures with "You make me feel that Spring has sprung" and "I want to bounce the moon just like a toy balloon," both in among the rhymes of "You Make Me Feel So Young."

Space restrictions force us to omit the Forties and all the great ones he fashioned with **Harry Warren**.

In summary, **Mack Gordon**, a

sweetheart of a guy, possessed of heart as big as he was, represented a breed indigenous to another era. Most of them have long since gone. Those who remain are relatively inactive. Too bad the kids of today have so few memories to draw upon.

"Only once in every lifetime someone just like you appears." It relates well to **Mack Gordon**. Ironically, these are his words from "Never In A Million Years."

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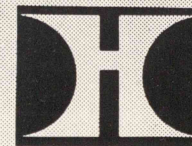
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
